Adge and the Wurzels made a very successful visit to the Webbington Country Club, during the week before Easter, followed by an energetic week down at the Jail House Club in Bodmin.

I am sure that most of you have Adge and the Wurzels 3rd L.P. called 'Cutler of the West', and perhaps like me you have been wondering exactly what Adge was referring to when introducing Cyril Tawney's song 'Five Foot Flirt' when he said "This is going pretty well actually, we haven't had no bricks through the window or anything yet tonight, for all of you who don't know it really happened". For the recording of the 2nd L.P., 'Adge Cutler's Family Album' - at the Royal Oak, Nailsea, many fans turned up without tickets, hoping they would be able to get in. When no room could be found for them, they had to be turned away. Evidently someone was rather aggravated at not being able to see the performance and hurled a stone through the window of the room where the recording was being made. Reg tells me that this incident can be heard on the L.P. I've listened to it, but didn't hear anything of the disturbance - perhaps one of you will be more perceptive. Please let me know if you think you have found it.

Anyone who has heard the Wurzels perform, either in person or on record, will appreciate what fine musicians they all are. I wondered how much practice and experience has gone into their playing to achieve the high standard they offer us, their fans, during each performance. So I started off by asking Tommy Banner, and this is a small part of his very varied musical experience.

Tommy was still of school age when he had his first experience of music, which was learning to play classical compositions on the piano. Although a good pianist, he took no music examinations, but when he left school at the age of 18, he had gained 4 '0' level G.C.E's and 2 'A' level G.C.E.'s in Latin and English. The day he received the results of his A level examinations, he was told he had failed an exam. to obtain an Executive Office position in the Civil Service, and also that he had been accepted as a pianist for the summer season with the Lex McLean show at the Glasgow Pavilion. This was followed by various shows which took him to England, Scotland and Ireland. He then played for a time with a group of four musicians before becoming a commercial traveller. Tommy couldn't have been happy away from music, because he was soon back into a job as a band leader on the 'Capetown Castle' and the 'Pendennis Castle', two boats journeying from Southampton to South Africa. After a couple of years he left, and while playing in Glasgow in 1967, he met Tucker Finlayson, the base player with Acker Bilk. He told Tommy that Adge Cutler was looking for a pianist/accordion player to join the Wurzels. Although at this time, Tommy had a contract as a lounge pianist for a round the world tour on the liner 'Oronsay', he felt that he couldn't miss the opportunity to play and tour the West Country - a part of the country which was new to him. So, he left the 'Oronsay' and joined Adge and the Wurzels. I am sure you will agree with me when I say we are very glad that you did, Tommy !.

Next month I hope to be able to tell you how Reg Quantrill joined Adge and the Wurzels.

I had a request from one fan asking for the words of a certain part of 'Dorset is Beautiful'. For that person and for anyone else who may be a little uncertain of some of the words of this song, I have sent a sheet with the full lyric of this song.

Membership of the fan club will now run from March 1st 1970, to February 28th 1971, and is renewable annually. Should anyone join between seasons as it were, previous issues of the newsletter will be sent to them.
